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# Lesson Guide and Applicable Michigan Social Studies Standards and Content Expectations for 2nd and 3rd Grades

## PETOSKEY, MICHIGAN: CARNEGIE PUBLIC LIBRARY (1908)

This *TimeShift* episode takes students on a virtual field trip to Petoskey, Michigan at the turn of the 20th century. The focus of this lesson is on one of the city's most historic places: The Carnegie Public Library, which is currently on the National Register of Historic Places.

Originally called Bear Creek, Petoskey was named in honor of Chief Ignatius Petosega - the revered leader of the indigenous people of the Odawa Nation, many of whom still live in the area today.

Viewers get a glimpse of what life was like at the turn of the 20th century as Petoskey is transformed from a Native American community to a bustling city of over 6,000 residents. As trains, lumberjacks and tourists came to Petoskey, the village became a city with a harbor, hotels, and an elected city council. Those civic leaders make good on wealthy businessman Andrew Carnegie's generous commitment to fund the construction of a library in their city, if they could financially sustain the library's year to year operations.

Watch as the community debates and then rallies to support the construction of this library. It is one of over 1,600 Carnegie libraries built across the nation. Sixty-one were built in Michigan. Even as a modern library now supports the 21st century needs of the local residents, the Carnegie building in Petoskey is still open to the public. However, a time capsule placed within the building's cornerstone in 1908 has yet to be unsealed.
